The Story Behind Jagannath Temple



Jagannath Temple, Puri (Odisha) is one of the four Dhams. Here is a very short version of the story behind the Sri Jagannath (Sri Krishna) temple. After 36 years of the Mahabharat war, Sri Krishna was ready to leave this mortal world (Mrityu Lok) after fulfilling his duties. He also got cursed by Gandhari as she held Krishna responsible for the death of her 100 children in the Mahabharat war. Sri Krishna wanted to leave this world and for that, he orchestrated a divine play (leela). Sri Krishna was mortally wounded by the arrow of a fisherman called Jara. After Krishna left his body, Arjuna cremated it. To his surprise, Krishna's whole body got burnt to ashes except his heart which continued to burn. Arjuna heard the divine order to cast the burning heart into the sea, so he did.

The heart kept on floating on the sea and gradually turned into a blue statue of Krishna - *Nila'madhava* (the blue Krishna). A tribal group enshrined the Nilamadhava statue in a cave. King Indradyumna heard about the Nilamadhava, he thought Krishna needs a grand temple, not a primitive cave. King Indradyumna came to forcefully retrieve the idol, accompanied by his army. To his shock, the idol vanished from the cave. Indradyumna realized his mistake and begged for forgiveness.

Indradyumna was deeply traumatized by the incident and was constantly pleading with Sri Krishna for his forgiveness. One night in the dream, Sri Krishna asked him to return to the sea-beach of Puri and search for a wooden log which would bear the mark of Vishnu. Indradyumna searched and found the log with the mark. After retrieving the log, King Indradyumna searched for able sculptors who could sculpt the idol of Vishnu. He couldn't find a single sculptor who could even scratch the wood.

After a few days, an old man approached Indradyumna who claimed that he could carve out idol from the woods. His condition was that he will work in a locked room and nobody should disturb him. The King agreed to his request and the sculptor started working on the statue.

The wife of the king, queen Gundicha would listen to the hammer sound of the sculptor on a daily basis. One day the sound stopped, King and the queen rushed and force opened the doors. To their surprise, the sculptor wasn't there and the three incomplete idols of Sri Jagannath, his brother Sri Balabhadra and sister Subhadra stood there with their big round eyes and a big smile. King Indradyumna enshrined the incomplete idols into the temple of Puri. The mark of Shri Vishnu, the transformed heart of Sri Krishna was carved out of the log and put inside the idols. This heart is called "Daru Brahma" means the "wooden soul".

The idols of Shri Jagannath and Balabhadra have no palms or fingers and Subhadra's idol has no hands at all. Even after enshrining the idols inside the temple, King Indradyumna could not find a sculptor to fix the idols. Again Sri Krishna came in his dreams and told him - "Don't try to complete me - if I get hands, my ardent devotees will become dependent on me. I want everyone to be self-dependent and strong to protect me".

Numerous barbaric Muslim invaders tried to destroy the Jagannath temple and tried to desecrate the idols of Shri Jagannath, Balabhadra and Subhadra but nobody was successful to even touch the idols.

Rath Yatra is the annual Rath (chariot) festival of Shri Jagannath in which Sri Jagannath, along with his brother, Balabhadra and sister Subhadra visits the Gundicha temple which is about 3 KM (1.9 miles) away from the Jagannath temple.
